#### **Brief Description of Program**

The Injury and Violence Prevention Branch (IVPB) mission is to promote and protect the health and well-being of all people in North Carolina by preventing injury and violence. In 2017 the Branch was awarded funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to implement the Enhanced Surveillance of Opioid-Involved Morbidity and Mortality (ESOOS) program.

The purpose of this funding is to support states with a high burden of drug overdoses to quickly improve the timeliness of fatal and nonfatal opioid overdose surveillance, including overdoses related to opioid pain relievers and heroin. Improvements in risk factor reporting are also funded. These improvements should inform state and local interventions in areas of greatest need. The 3 strategies that must be undertaken are:

- 1. Increase the timeliness of aggregate nonfatal opioid overdose reporting.
- 2. Increase the timeliness of fatal opioid overdose and associated risk factor reporting.
- 3. Disseminate surveillance findings to key stakeholders working to prevent or respond to opioid overdoses.
