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**Brief Description of Program:**

This program provides adoption assistance to certain children with special needs following entry of a Decree of Adoption. To qualify, these children must be in the placement responsibility of a North Carolina licensed private adoption agency or had been in the placement responsibility of a North Carolina licensed private adoption agency and meet all other adoption assistance eligibility requirements. Payments must be no greater than the foster care board rate. In addition, vendor payments for medical and non-medical specialized services may be provided up to \$2,400 per year.

Effective October 1, 2011 10A NCAC 70M .0403 was amended to include: "No monthly cash assistance payments from the State Fund for Adoptive Children with Special Needs shall be made for any adoption in which the Decree of Adoption is issued on or after October 1, 2011." All adoption assistance agreements signed prior to October 1, 2011 remain in effect. As of February 2022, statewide 370 cases were identified as active, and the total should continue to decrease across each fiscal year.

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**Brief Description of Program:**

Give a brief description of program including allowable activities:

The State Adult Home Specialist Fund was established by the General Assembly during the 1999 Session. Originally \$1,400,000 in State funds was identified for the Fund and allocations were made to county departments of social services where adult care home beds are located. County allocations are based on the number of adult care homes in each county as a proportion of the total number of homes statewide. These funds are intended to allow county departments of social services to increase the amount of time spent monitoring adult care homes in their county to assure compliance with licensure regulations. The federal financial participation rate (FFP) is 50% federal, 25% State, and 25% county. The total amount of State funds available to counties is \$875,000.

These funds may be used to create new adult home specialist positions in a county department of social services or to increase the full-time equivalency of an existing adult home specialist position. The Fund may also be used to upgrade and pay for salary increases to adult home specialist positions re-classified from Social Worker II to Social Worker III.

These individuals, once identified by the local authority as consumers in need of assistance, have access to program funds. Examples of what funds are used for are as follows: equipment/devices, behavioral supports, in-home supports, community supports, transportation, residential support, etc. The funds are used as a provider of last resort above and beyond what other funding sources may cover. These funds are also available when an individual is not eligible for any other funding source. Additional program needs identified may allow local authorities, other agencies and providers of service to people with traumatic brain injury to develop programs to meet specific needs. These funds are also used for funding other traumatic brain injury-related initiatives to improve the State and local service systems in identifying and increasing support and service to individuals with traumatic brain injury.

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**Brief Description of Program:**

The goals of the Urgent Repair Program ("URP") are: 1) to alleviate housing conditions which pose an imminent threat to the life or safety of very low and low-income homeowners with special needs; and 2) to provide accessibility modifications and other repairs necessary to prevent displacement of very low and low-income homeowners with special needs, such as frail elderly and persons with disabilities. It is an objective of the URP to serve households with urgent repair needs which cannot be met through other state- or federally-funded housing assistance programs.

Program funds may be used for two purposes only: 1) "Hard costs" (materials, labor, etc.) associated with repairs or modifications of eligible dwelling units; and 2) "program support" costs for activities ancillary to the rehabilitation work (inspections, work write-ups, cost estimates, etc.). More specific definitions of these cost categories are provided in the Program Guidelines at section 2.1, "Eligible Uses of Funds" ("PG 2.1"). Definitions vary slightly by funding cycle.

Unless specifically funded for disaster assistance ("URP-D"), recipients must limit hard costs and soft cost to a maximum of \$10,000 per dwelling unit. Recipients may set more stringent limits, in their adopted Assistance Policies, than program limits.

Program support costs are limited, on a unit-by-unit basis, based on the amount of hard costs. Under URP94, that maximum was 10% of hard costs. Since URP97, a tiered approach has been used with levels of program support maximums based on ranges of hard costs. See P.G. 2.1.8 for details.

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**Brief Description of Program:**

**I. PROGRAM OBJECTIVES**

In accordance with North Carolina General Statutes 143B-820, State Subsidy to County Detention Facilities, the Section shall administer a State subsidy program to pay a county that provides juvenile detention services and meets State standards a certain per diem per juvenile. In general, this per diem should be fifty percent (50%) of the total cost of caring for a juvenile from within the county and one hundred percent (100%) of the total cost of caring for a juvenile from another county. Any county placing a juvenile in a detention facility in another county shall pay fifty percent (50%) of the total cost of caring for the juvenile to the Section. The per diem rate is set at \$244 per juvenile, per day.

**II. PROGRAM PROCEDURES**

The five (5) counties that provide juvenile detention services are Durham, Guilford, Mecklenburg, Madison and Brunswick. The Durham County-operated facility, the Guilford County-operated facility and the Mecklenburg County-operated facility submit invoices to Juvenile Justice/Detention Services section by the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month. The invoices are reviewed for any errors in the number of days a juvenile was detained and the county responsible for the bill. The Madison County-operated facility and the Brunswick County-operated facility submit invoices to Juvenile Justice/Detention Services section by the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month for utilization exceeding the minimum number of beds provided pursuant to respective agreements. The invoices are reviewed for any errors in the number of days a juvenile was detained and the county responsible for the bill, as well as against the terms of the Memos of Agreement.

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**Brief Description of Program:**

Project C.A.R.E. (Caregiver Alternatives to Running on Empy) provides critical comprehensive support, including respite care vouchers, to vulnerable unpaid family caregivers of individuals living with Alzheimer's disease or other related dementia (ADRD). The program effectively reaches isolated rural and minority communities through culturally sensitive outreach strategies with a unique family-centered, in-home intervention. Project C.A.R.E. aims to minimize State expenses and maximize the family's potential to provide the most appropriate, high quality and cost-effective care in the least restrictive setting thus delaying or preventing the need for institutionalization.

Project C.A.R.E. contracts with six community-based organizations to provide care consultation services in all 100 counties. Family consultants collaborate closely with the sixteen Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) and the Family Caregiver Support Program. This relationship allows for available resources to be coordinated and leveraged for maximum impact. Family consultants provide support directly to caregivers of persons living with ADRD by:

1. Offering care consultation services: dementia-specific information, caregiver assessments and individualized care plans, caregiver education and connections to social support networks,
2. Linking families with available community resources to address unmet needs including local support groups, supportive services, entitlement programs and other community resources,
3. Partnering with each AAA through its Family Caregiver Support Program to provide outreach, training and education,
4. Providing caregivers consumer-directed respite care vouchers (\$500 each) whereby the caregiver decides who, when and where to hire help,
5. Providing training and assistance to AAA and the community-at-large to increase capacity to assist persons with dementia and their families and
6. Enhancing partnerships with and among the various entities serving persons living with ADRD and assisting their care partners.

This grant supports enhanced surveillance capacity at the state level to prevent and eliminate childhood lead poisoning, and to use surveillance data to identify the highest risk areas and implement appropriate population-based interventions. Examples of such interventions include enforcement of housing and health codes and public and health care provider education campaigns. Data may also be used to designate areas as 'lead safe' and qualify applicants to apply for a universal blood lead testing waiver through Medicaid. Surveillance data is also used to evaluate the timeliness and efficacy of case management of children identified with high blood lead levels.

This grant was acquired through a competitive application process submitted through the grants.gov website. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) awarded North Carolina \$534,000, beginning September 30, 2020, for the third year of a three-year project period. This project is 100% federally funded and has no matching or maintenance of effort requirements. The one subrecipient, UNC Chapel Hill Institute for the Environment (\$125,103), was selected based on necessary technical skills (e.g., health education and grant coordination expertise) and was approved by the CDC through the application review process. The portion of the grant transferred to UNC is by contract reimbursement. Performance requirements and measures are communicated to the UNC through the contracting process. Deliverables are monitored by site visits and required reports. Grant awards may not be expended for research, medical care and treatment, or for environmental remediation of lead sources. Funds may be used only for reasonable program purposes, including personnel, travel, supplies, and services.

The Injury and Violence Prevention Branch (IVPB) mission is to promote and protect the health and well-being of all people in North Carolina by preventing injury and violence. In 2011 the Branch was awarded funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to implement the Core Violence and Injury Prevention Program (CORE VIPP).

The overall purpose of the program is to assist State Health Departments (SHDs) to build and/or maintain effective delivery systems for dissemination, implementation and evaluation of best practice programs and policies. This includes support for general capacity building of SHDs and their local partners, as well as strategy specific capacity building for the implementation of direct best practice interventions (older adult falls and child injury). In addition, this program supports SHDs in their efforts towards integration or the strategic alignment of resources for meaningful change.

**Base Component (BASE):** This component will provide support to SHDs to develop and strengthen their injury and violence prevention programs by increasing general capacity in key areas identified as core components of SHD injury and violence prevention programs. Additional focus will be placed on traumatic brain injury and falls prevention activities focused on seniors.

**Regional Network Coordinating Organization (RNCO):** Resources and capacity for injury and violence prevention and control are limited and vary by state. Systematic efforts are needed to share information and best practices and make it available to all potential users. A regional network of states encourages the creation, sharing and effective application of knowledge to address injury and violence prevention and control within all states. The purpose of the regional network coordinating organization is to collaborate across and

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between states to build capacity, share best practices and scientific evidence and increase injury and violence prevention capacity through the regional network to prevent and reduce injury and violence.

**Enhance Supplement (ENHANCED):** This component will provide support to community coalitions to build capacity through the implementation of public health actions to prevent injury in disproportionately affected communities. This supplemental funding will focus on providing training on community-level factors that reinforce Adverse Childhood Experiences, AKA ACES, as well as provide community coalitions with training and technical assistance to implement strategies that promote injury and violence prevention.

**Brief Description of Program:**

The purpose of the Healthy Beginnings Program is to fund projects in various communities to impact the reduction of minority infant mortality and preterm and low birthweight births to improve minority birth outcomes. Funds are given to local health departments and private non-profit organizations to support local community-based minority infant mortality reduction efforts.

In 1994, the North Carolina General Assembly appropriated \$750,000 annually to fund fifteen projects that would demonstrate means to lower infant mortality and low birth weight rates among minority populations. Funding was decreased in 2001 to \$700,000 to fund 14 projects. In 2009, funds from the Targeted Infant Mortality Reduction Program (TIMR) were merged with Healthy Beginnings. The goal of the Healthy Beginnings Program is to address the two-fold plus disparity between white and minority infant mortality in the State of North Carolina by targeting areas with significant minority infant mortality. A community-based approach addressing infant mortality was mandated with a specific focus on the formulation and implementation of innovative strategies to improve birth outcomes and involvement from a variety of community organizations.

Community and faith-based organizations and local health departments with experience working in minority communities are eligible to apply for Healthy Beginnings funding.

Funded recipients are expected to implement programs that will impact the reduction of minority infant mortality and low birthweight births in their communities and thereby improve minority birth outcomes. Funding is available for 3 years, contingent upon the availability of funds and performance. In FY2021-2022, there are 10 sites funded at an award level of \$77,000 to \$79,000 annually.

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**Brief Description of Program:**

The Tobacco Prevention and Control Branch (TPCB) collaborates with and builds capacity of partners, including State and local agencies, local health departments and community organizations, to plan and implement culturally appropriate evidence-based strategies to reduce deaths and health problems due to tobacco use and secondhand smoke (SHS). TPCB's four major goal areas are to: 1) Prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth and young adults, 2) Promote tobacco use cessation among adults and youth, 3) Eliminate exposure to SHS, and 4) Advance health equity by identifying and eliminating commercial tobacco product-related inequities and disparities.

Tobacco use remains the number one preventable cause of early death and disease in North Carolina. Smoking is responsible for 14,200 deaths per year – 1 of every 5 deaths in North Carolina – and is a major risk factor for the leading causes of premature death. For each death, 30 more people are sick or disabled because of tobacco use. In 2019 North Carolina ranked 38<sup>th</sup> in the nation for adult cigarette smoking with a rate of 18.5% (where being ranked 1<sup>st</sup> is best.) North Carolina's direct medical costs from smoking are \$3.81 billion each year and the estimated annual health care costs from exposure to secondhand smoke are \$293 million. Smoking caused productivity losses in North Carolina are an additional \$4.24 billion annually. According to the 2014 US Surgeon General's Report, tobacco product marketing is key factor that sustains the tobacco epidemic. In North Carolina, the current estimate that the tobacco industry spends to

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market their addictive products is \$391.m million annually. While cigarette smoking has declined among North Carolina's young people from 15.5% of high school students in 2011 to 5.7% in 2019, all tobacco use increased from 25.8% of high school students in 2011 to 27.3% in 2021 due to the use of emerging tobacco products, especially flavored electronic cigarettes/e-cigarettes/vaping devices, which are the top tobacco product used by high school students. E-cigarettes are followed by cigarette use, and then cigars/cigarillos/little cigars, which are often marketed with flavors.

The purpose of the Infant Mortality Reduction program is to provide funds to local health departments to implement evidence-based programs in the counties that have experienced the highest infant mortality rates during the five-year period of 2010-2014.

In the state fiscal year 2015-2016, the North Carolina General Assembly appropriated one million five hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$1,575,000) in the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Plan to the Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Division of Public Health (DPH) for each year of the 2015-2017 fiscal biennium to be used for evidence-based programs in North Carolina counties with the highest infant mortality rates. These funds continue to be re-appropriated.

All local health departments were required to implement or expand upon at least one evidence-based strategy that is proven to lower infant mortality rates. The evidence-based strategies were the following: 17P (alpha hydroxyprogesterone) injections to prevent preterm births; Centering Pregnancy model of group prenatal care; doula services program, reproductive life planning services; Nurse Family Partnership program; infant safe sleep practices; and tobacco cessation and prevention. The selected strategies have all proven to be an effective means to improve birth outcomes through addressing pregnancy intendedness, preterm birth, and/or infant death.

The funding distribution was based on the number of infant deaths per county during the five-year period of 2010-2014. In 2021-2022, there were 21 local health departments funded under this program.

The priority strategies are:

1. Enhance and maximize a state PDMP (Prescription Drug Monitoring Program).
2. Implement community or insurer/health system interventions aimed at preventing prescription drug overdose and abuse.
3. Conduct policy evaluations.
4. Develop and implement Rapid Response Projects.
5. Increase the timeliness and dissemination of aggregate fatal and nonfatal opioid overdose and associated risk factor reporting.
